Tierra Nueva

We seek to raise up disciples of Jesus through engagement in active faith communities: jail, prison, migrant camps, homes, and churches.

Family Support Center and Migrant Chaplaincy

Mission:

The current political climate continues to be a point of unease and mistrust with our local migrant population.

Our commitment to stand with the migrant community in supportive, pastoral relationships remains as strong as ever.

Family Support Center and Migrant Chaplaincy are the lifeblood of Tierra Nueva. We are known in the community as a hub of support, welcoming, kindness, and prayer. Our team's overflowing hearts of compassion gathers God's people on the streets to receive Christ's boundless love.

Impact:

- conducted 87 pastoral visits that included prayer, visiting migrant camps, the Faith House and the Trust recovery houses, and listening to griefs and struggles
- received 39 visits: prayer, help with applications, use of computer, and connection to supporting agencies
- distributed 1,230 diapers
- $\hbox{-} \ {\rm received} \ 351 \ {\rm visits} \ {\rm to} \ {\rm the} \ {\rm clothing} \ {\rm closet} \\$
- \bullet served as mail pickup location for 47 families
- provided 53 rides to food banks, court dates, documents, and often times people showing up just needing a ride home



These numbers reflect the services our staff performed on Mondays and Wednesdays. We've since begun collecting data all throughout the week. Look forward to a more accurate representation of our work in 2018.

Jail Ministry

Mission:

Most jail inmates view God as a judge or prosecutor, ready to convict and damn them forever. Tierra Nueva's Skagit County Jail Ministry seeks out prisoners who feel rejected, condemned, and forgotten. We consider them lost treasures. Our aim is to incorporate them into a community of faith. Through open discussion of scripture and healing prayer, many inmates are discovering that God is eager to liberate, heal, love, and restore them.

- We have four new chaplains: Danielle Riley, Kevin Riley, Deana Strom, and Don Harpole. As formerly incarcerated individuals, it is a huge victory to have Danielle and Kevin serving in this capacity.
- In October, the new Skagit County Community Justice Center (County Jail) opened and we have been collaborating with jail staff on best practices in the new environment and adjusting our chaplaincy schedules.

- ullet Our chaplains conduct 9 weekly Bible Studies at the Skagit County Jail, Thursdays and Sundays; approximately 450 Bible Studies every year.
- We visit the Munroe Correctional Facility twice every month; $\bf 24$ Bible Studies every year.





Mission:

Our Sunday afternoon faith community continues to more reflect our vision of a sheep pen for the "lost sheep" we encounter on the margins of Skagit County.

Our desire is for all to experience abundant, joy-filled life in communion with our heavenly Father. Our desire is to walk together as sisters and brothers of our Savior Jesus Christ. Our desire is to be guided, encouraged and empowered by the Holy Spirit for mutual liberation and sharing the Gospel. Many members of our faith community do not feel welcome in other congregations but feel at home at Tierra Nueva.

Our Hope:

- Experience a personal connection with the living Jesus, who brings us to the Father, and fills us with the Holy Spirit.
- Experience God's empowering love mediated through vibrant worship, community, Scripture, and the Sacraments (Communion, Baptism).
- Grow as disciples of Jesus through increased understanding of life in Christ received through teaching, preaching, and conversation.
- Receive prayer for needs, including physical and emotional healing.
- Go deeper in holistic transformation through TN's prayer ministry, New Earth Recovery, The People's Seminary, and faith community trainings.

- Partnering with local churches in children's ministry

The People's Seminary

Mission:

TPS is committed to training leaders from the margins, equipping the larger body of Christ for transformational ministry to the underreached and excluded. TN Skagit has been described as the vineyard from which the wine of TPS teaching is produced.

TPS trains primarily, though not exclusively, through the Certificate for Transformational Ministry on the Margins (CTMM). These are three four-day gatherings designed to encourage and equip God's people in sharing a liberating gospel to poor, marginalized, and unserved communities.

Theological education that connects the mainstream with the margins reveals a gospel that is active and powerful, enabling both groups to discover their vocation and serve together as Christ's body in the world.

- Social Prophetic Mission:

- CTMM module 2 in Kenya and Zimbabwe
- CTMM modules 2 & 3 in Burlington
- CTMM module 3 in London and Glasgow
- Hosted UK CTMM alumus gathering
- First ever "Training of the Trainers" conference in northern England
- Hosted "Reading the Bible with the Damned" workshops two weekends in Burlington
- First CTMMs in Siberia and Ethiopia

Pastoral Advocacy

Mission:

We come alongside people who are in the criminal justice system, actively using, in recovery, gang-affiliated, and struggling with mental illness. We primarily meet folks through the jail, the faith community, and the Family Support Center in order to connect people to Jesus. Through our Pastoral Advocates, they are received into a loving and safe community that offers pastoral care, practical support, and advocacy, addressing root issues and systemic blocks.



- 1. This year we started two Bible studies, one for men and one for women, for those connected to our faith community but with little prior church involvement. With these groups, we hosted events at the building, BBQs, movie nights, a summer festival, and a trip to the zoo.
- 2. We've continued to follow up with men and women when they get out of jail, as well as write to folks who are transferred to prison. We lead Bible studies in the jail and visit with community. Two of our women pastoral advocates able were to visit three women in a women's prison three hours away, and another advocate visited some youth in juvenile detention who had been transferred to long-term Male continued advocates programs. correspondence and visits to numerous inmates in prison.
- We walk with many burdened with addiction and mental health issues. We seek to be a positive, consistent presence in their lives, checking regularly, and praying together everything. Our team also took three women and two men through the month-long individual six Genesis Process addiction recovery and relapse prevention program this year.

Impact Story

My work today takes me back to the streets. My life was trauma, guilt, addiction, and self-destruction. I was severely lost, and now am found. Jesus sends me back to the marginalized to rescue others like me.

I first met Daniel* at The Trust at New Earth Recovery four years ago. We were both struggling through our addictions.

Two years ago, Daniel was overcome with shame and took his own life through asphyxiation. He was officially brain dead and descended to hell. When he was found by his family, the church gathered in vigorous prayer and, though suffering brain damage, Daniel returned back to the living.

I met with him weekly so we could encourage each other, encounter faith-based studies, and pray. He relapsed again. I continued to visit him in one of the local treatment centers as a brother and advcoate. By the grace of God, Daniel engaged with the social workers and voluntarily sought further, more holistic treatment in mental health. Along with the community at Tierra Nueva, I surrounded him with prayer and Bible passages to encourage his healing. He was moved to various facilities and treatment programs in and out of Washington state.

His struggles, like mine, are not uncommon.


His triumph, like mine, is full of grace and nothing short of a miracle. Our Savior brought him back from the dead, back to his family, and back to the Skagit Valley. Today

he is clean of addiction, in active recovery, gainfully employed, reunited with his family, and active in our community here.

Mission:

Underground Writing is a literature-based creative writing program serving migrant, incarcerated, recovery, and other at-risk communities in northern Washington through literary engagement and personal restoration. We facilitate generative encounters with literature spanning the tradition—from ancient texts to those written in our workshops. Honoring the transforming power of the word, we believe that attentive reading leads to attentive writing, and that attentive writing has the power to assist in the restoration of communities, the imagination, and individual lives.

Mission:

Tierra Nueva Honduras is committed to building thriving households of faith and churches in rural Honduras. Our focus is reaching the unreached, those excluded from the church.

Impact:

New church building opened and over 40 people meeting in the village of Mal Paso, a small town that has been traumatized by violence that reflect the general lawlessness in Honduras at this time.

Minas de Oro is the base of operations for Tierra Nueva and gathering place for some 70 + people for worship and teaching.






